Background and Education:

Prior to joining the Center in September 2007, Kiely was Associate Professor of History and Asian studies at Furman University in Greenville, South Carolina. He directed the Furman-in-China programs at Suzhou University and East China Normal University in Shanghai, was a co-founder of the U.S. State Department Critical Languages Grant funded Furman-Suzhou Intensive Summer Chinese Language Institute, and chaired the Asian Studies Department. He has taught and studied at Central China Normal University, the Chinese University of Hong Kong, the University of Hawaii at Manoa, the University of California, Berkeley, Nanjing University and Harvard University. He is a former Yale-China Fellow, Beijing University Fellow, and National Committee on United States-China Relations Public Intellectuals Program Fellow. Kiely first lived and studied in China at the Number Seven Middle School in Chengdu in 1982-83 and has lived in China, off and on, for nearly ten years. At the Center, Kiely occasionally teaches thesis preparation and history seminars.

Kiely received his B.A. in East Asian studies from Yale University in 1988, an M.A. in Asian history from the University of Hawaii at Manoa in 1993, and a Ph.D. in Chinese history from the University of California, Berkeley in 2001.

He currently is working on two books – a study of prison education and reform programs and a study of urban Buddhist activists and civil society both in early and mid-twentieth century China.
